International Pre-Travel Checklist

Step	Description
1. Passport Application or Renewal	Ensure your passport is valid for at least 6 months beyond your travel dates. Processing times vary from a few days to 6 weeks depending on the service you choose (check the website for details). 3. Health and Vaccination Requirements	Verify required vaccinations and health advisories for your destination. Resource: CDC – Travelers' Health Website: <u>Destinations Travelers' Health CDC</u> https://wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/destinations/list
4. Travel Insurance	Purchase comprehensive travel insurance that covers medical emergencies and trip cancellations. 5. Book Flights	Search for flights and compare prices using trusted travel sites.
6. Reserve Accommodations	Book hotels or other accommodations in advance using trusted services and hotel booking sites.

7. Local Transportation	Reserve car rentals, train tickets, or other local transportation as needed. A good place to start is the US Dept. of State to learn more about your destination. 8. Customs and Entry Requirements	Review customs regulations and entry forms for your destination. 9. Currency Exchange and Finances	Notifying your bank of travel plans is a good idea (can also exchange currency). 10. Emergency Preparation	Know the location of your country's embassy and emergency contact numbers. Resource: U.S. Embassy Finder Website: <u>Official list of embassies from the</u> <u>U.S. Department of State</u> https://www.usembassy.gov
Travel Tip: Documents	Make a list of all the required documents for the destination you are traveling to. You will want to keep all documents on you (do not pack in suitcase) - make a copy of all for yourself - give copy to a trusted friend/family member - keep pictures of all documents on your phone as well.
